First line and history

Thank you. This is my good lady - Charlotte.

Well, I've come about a problem that I have, here in this area, the stomach area. I've got, like a lump that comes down, and I do go and have a camera for my bladder and that's due on the, I think it's the eleventh or twelfth of July – but it should have been the second. But this seems to be getting bigger, this lump. I was just wondering if it was my bladder or what.

Ideas – No, no, I don't have any theories, no. (Charlotte - He's very... he doesn't tell you a lot, he's very reticent.

If the doctor asks again Charlotte will admit that she thinks it is a hernia.)

Concerns – Well, that it shouldn't be there, so, I fear that I'm not sure what it could be, really. I think it could be associated with the bladder.

If the doctor asks again: you admit that you are worried it might be the cancer that has spread.

Expectation – To be reassured that you don't have cancer. You will take the doctor's recommendation for treatment if the doctor tells you that you have a hernia.
